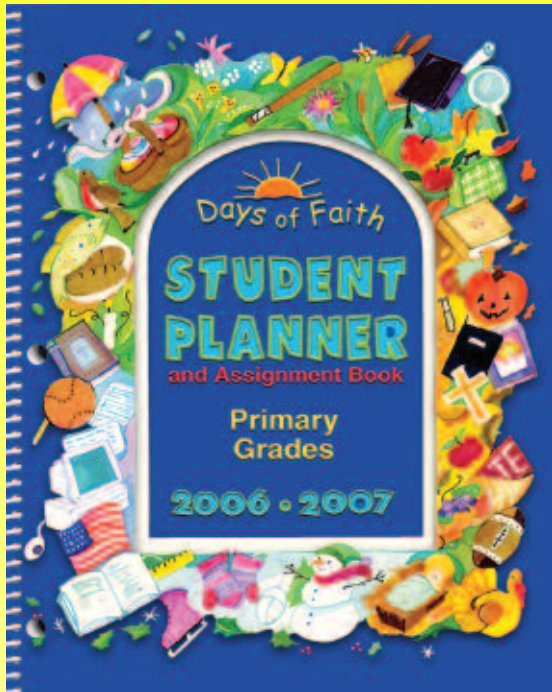
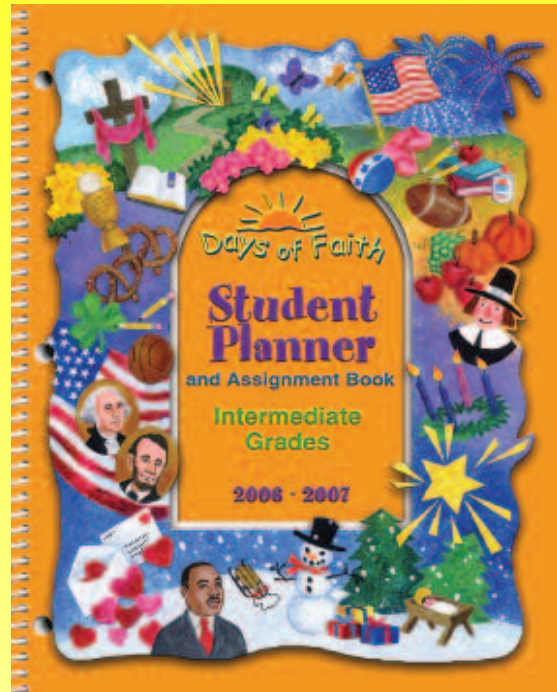

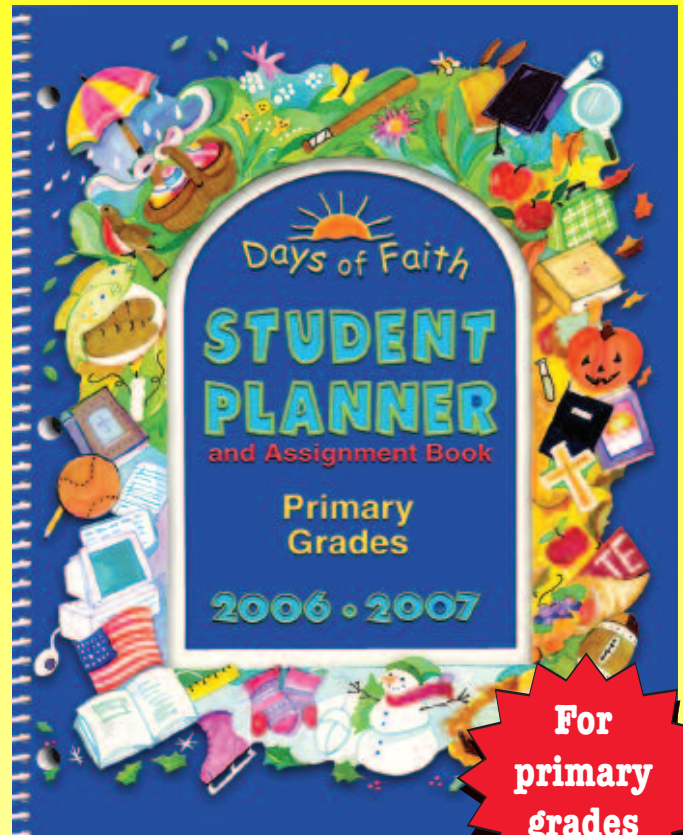

September 2006 The Month Ahead

Who do you say I am?

Teachers are very important to all of us. We learn things from them that help us from the time we are first born until the time we die.

Last month we talked about Jesus when he was a student like you. Remember how he loved to listen to his teachers and ask questions? That's how he learned, and all those days of learning paid off when he grew up. He became a very important and very special teacher himself!

Your Teacher

Thousands of people traveled long distances to hear Jesus teach about his Father and about how we should live.

Jesus was a great storyteller, and he loved to use stories to teach people. The stories he told are called "parables." Some of Jesus' most important lessons were taught through parables.

No matter what Jesus was teaching, though, he always made it clear to people that he was teaching them what his Father had told him to teach. Jesus said, "My teaching is not mine but his who sent me" (John 7:16).

When you say your prayers each night, ask God's blessing on all your teachers, and thank Jesus for being your best teacher ever.

The Old Testament books make up the front part of the Bible. They are books about God's people before Jesus was born.

The New Testament books are toward the back of the Bible. They are about the life of Jesus and the lives of his followers after Jesus returned to his Father.

Find It!

How to Use Your Bible

Because Jesus' teachings are so important to us, they were written down and kept. We can read them any time we want in our Bibles. Do you know how to use your Bible?

It helps to know that the Bible is a big book with many smaller books in it. Each book in the Bible has a title. Often the title is the name of the person who wrote the book or is thought to have written the book.

To find a verse in your Bible, you need to know:

1. the name of the book
2. the chapter number
3. the verse number

If you need more than one verse, you will need the number for the first verse and the number for the last verse.

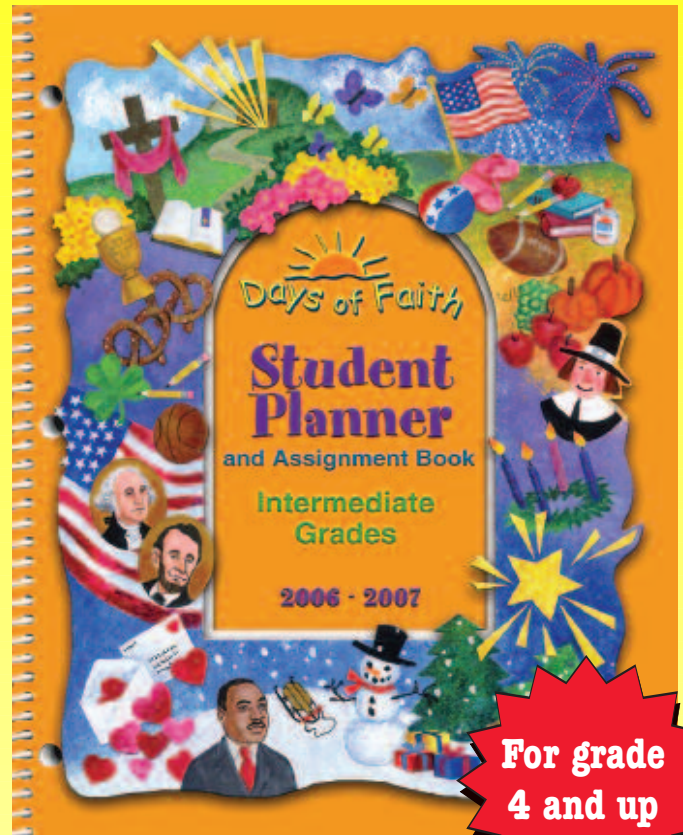

The Month Ahead . . . September 2006

Jesus, Your Teacher
Jesus was a very special teacher. His teachings fill the New Testament. If you want to know how to love God and others, read Mark 12:28-31. There Jesus taught us the Greatest Commandment. If you want to know how to pray, read Matthew 6:7-14. There Jesus gives us the Lord's Prayer. Jesus was also a very interesting teacher. He was careful to speak to people in ways they could understand. That's why Jesus taught some of his most important lessons in stories called "parables." You can find some good examples of parables in chapter 13 of Matthew's Gospel. First, Jesus tells the parable of the sower (13-9). Then he carefully explains the story (13-24). So Jesus was a very good teacher who taught important lessons in interesting ways. But the most important thing about Jesus' teaching is this. In Jesus' own words, "My teaching is not mine but his who sent me" (John 7:16).

WHO? do you say I am?
There Jesus taught us the Greatest Commandment. If you want to know how to pray, read Matthew 6:7-14. There Jesus gives us the Lord's Prayer. Jesus was also a very interesting teacher. He was careful to speak to people in ways they could understand.
