### Today's Gospel » Matthew 6:1-6, 16-18

On my journey with Jesus, I learned it was important how you do good works, pray, and fast.



Jesus said, "Don't show off to others how holy you are. If you do, my Father will not reward you in heaven" (6:1).

Today, Jesus tells us how to have a good attitude when we do good works, pray, and fast. We must do them right. Check the correct meaning to Jesus' words.

**Doing good works** means helping someone who needs it. When you do this, Jesus says, "Do not sound a trumpet before you" (6:2).

#### WHAT DOES HE MEAN?

- ☐ Don't blow a horn when you give money at church.
- ☐ Don't help others just so people will praise you.

**Praying** is talking with God. Jesus says not to stand and pray on street corners but to pray behind closed doors (6:5-6).

#### WHAT DOES HE MEAN?

- □ Don't pray outside.
- ☐ Don't pray just so other people will think you are holy.

**Fasting** means giving up something you really like. It can be something you eat, like candy, or a bad habit, like pushing ahead in line. When you fast, Jesus says to fast in secret (6:18).

#### WHAT DOES HE MEAN?

- ☐ Don't let anyone see you skip the candy bowl at Grandma's.
- ☐ Don't make a big show of skipping the candy bowl just so others will see how good you are.



## Today's Gospel » Luke 9:22–25

On my journey with Jesus, I learned that I must carry a cross.



Jesus said, "Anyone who follows me must put others before themselves. They must take up their crosses every day" (9:23).

To take up your cross means to accept cheerfully the hard things in your life. Doing good works, praying, and fasting can be hard.

Here are some crosses you might have to bear. If the cross is a good work, write **GW** in the box. If it is praying, write **P** in the box. If it is fasting, write **F** in the box.

Sweep the kitchen without being told.
 When you hear a siren, ask God to be with the people who need help.
 Skip the popcorn at the movies.
 Give your snack money to the missions.
 Read or tell a bedtime story to your little sister.



## **Today's Gospel » Matthew 9:14-15**

On my journey with Jesus, we met some followers of his cousin John.




John's followers asked Jesus, "Why do we have to fast so often, but your followers do not?" Jesus said: "When the bridegroom is still at the wedding, everyone celebrates" (9:14-15).

Jesus liked to answer questions by giving examples or by telling stories. Today he gave the example of a wedding. He is like the bridegroom, and his followers are like the guests. As long as he stays with his guests, everyone eats and visits and has fun. No one fasts.

Jesus knew that when he died, his followers would be sad.

Decode this message to find out what they would do.





### Today's Gospel » Luke 5:27-32

On my journey with Jesus, I learned that he came to help those who needed him.



Jesus asked Levi, a tax collector, to follow him. Levi followed. Later Levi invited Jesus to his home for dinner with some other tax collectors. Jesus went (5:27-29).

At that time, most tax collectors cheated people. Nobody liked them. So people were not happy to see Jesus eat dinner with them and be nice to them. They asked Jesus why he did this.
